Transcendent Love

Does love transcend physical death? Many who experience intense love for another ask this question and pray that it does. For the born-again Christian who will spend eternity in the ultimate loving atmosphere of heaven, it is perhaps a most uniquely relevant question. This is because love, God's unique divine love, exists in the heart of every true believer in Jesus. It is God's love reflected off the regenerated soul back to God and to all whose lives are touched by His grace. It is this returned love of His children for Him, which is the principal purpose of His having created mankind in the first place. Although the blessed union where the "...two shall become one flesh" (Ephesians 5:31) is broken due to the death and corruption of the flesh, love is <u>not</u> of the flesh, but of the soul and spirit. We are led to believe that we will retain our memories, and that even our bodies will be returned to us in uncorruptable

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perfect form. Surely love, which is the purest most perfect form of Godliness anyone can have, must be the most deeply etched aspect of our memory and of the substance of our soul. Therefore it must <u>also</u> cross the barrier into heaven. We know that in heaven we will be united with, recognize and have memory of, those friends and loved ones who are also there. (2Samuel 12:23, Luke16:22:30) Because of this, one could conclude that this special love, in fact all Godly love, which we now carry in our hearts, will be part of us forever. We can also expect that in our perfected eternal state, we will feel more powerfully and gloriously the love others have for us, as will our love be ever more profoundly felt by those we love. Why should it be otherwise? How could it be otherwise? Heaven's very atmosphere is love. God is love; God is in us here on earth, and will be in and around us forever. From the moment we committed to belief, faith, trust and obedience to our Savior, and we were born-again, His love has been in us. What we have done with that love, where and how we have used it, is an expression of the principal substance of our eternal being. How can it be otherwise than that we carry this into eternity?
